After the weekly collection was taken in Church a small child whispered to her mother, "Mommy how do they get the money that is collected up to heaven?" The mother paused for a moment on how to best answer her young daughter's question and then replied, "The Church doesn't send the money to heaven, but uses it to bring heaven down to us." That mother could not have given a better answer. For the purpose of the Church is to get God's heaven into each of us.



Hospital Visitations

Not only is the spiritual health of our members important but also their physical health. When a member enters into the Hospital it is important that Fr. Dean be notified. If a member himself/herself is entering the Hospital (at least over night), he/she should contact Fr. Dean beforehand if they know the day they will be entering. If a family member is entering the Hospital (at least over night), another family member should contact Fr. Dean beforehand if they know the day they will be entering. Obviously, in the case of an emergency, Fr. Dean should be notified immediately. Hospitals today no longer notify the Parish when a member enters into the Hospital. So, if someone is in the Hospital and Fr. Dean is NOT notified, don't blame him for not coming to see that member. Remember, Fr. Dean's ESP has been down for years.

The saint whose name leads all the rest who have sacrificed their lives for Jesus Christ is Stephen, the first martyr of Christendom because he would have been the last to deny him. Stephen was one of the seven deacons of the original Church of Christ in Jerusalem, sharing his duties with six others-Philip, Prochoros, Nikanor, Timon, Parmenas, and

Nicholas.

It was the function of the deacons to assist much as they do today in such matters as communion but with the additional responsibility of spreading the new faith and at the same time being ever on the alert for the imminent danger that came with being a Christian in those early days.

He must have done this several times and, in all probability, been unceremoniously ushered from the premises more than once, but there came an occasion when he addressed himself to an extremely hostile Council of el-Before entering the service of Christ, the ders whose anger drove them to more than young Stephen had studied under the rejust having Stephen put out. nowned rabbinical tutor Gamaliel, who had been the mentor of the great St. Paul.

Not unlike Paul he was a qualified religious scholar who once sought to discredit the Savior, until he came to know Jesus Christ and to embrace him as Paul did in that dramatic confrontation on the road to Damascus. The full attention he had been giving to the Law of the ancient covenant he now directed to the new faith with zeal equal to that of those who enjoyed the company of the Messiah. There was no hint that he would be the very first casualty in the cause of the Nazarene, but each and every one of the missionaries was aware of the danger involved and chose to ignore it in their anxiety to serve.

Stephen seems to have confined his missionary work and preaching to the city of Jerusalem, the city in which he had prepared himself under the Pharisee Gamaliel for quite another career.

Well versed in the Scriptures, he used the Old Testament to full advantage in promoting the Messiah, citing the passages that were ample evidence out of the mouths of the ancient prophets of God that a Savior would be born and that the Savior was among them even now in the person of Jesus Christ, the Son of God. It was with considerable anger and frustration that the men who had studied with him under Gamaliel now viewed the defector from their ranks, being particularly piqued when Stephen boldly challenged them in the synagogues.

The mob that turned on Stephen worked itself into such a feverous pitch that by the time he had been seized and dragged into the street a cry went up for his blood and grew into a crescendo demanding his death. He was dragged to the gates of Jerusalem and stoned him to death.

The gallant young Stephen died a brutal death at the hands of those with whom he had grown up. In the Book of Acts there is an account that Paul was among the onlookers who made no effort to save Stephen.

The early Christians buried Stephen in a small chapel in Jerusalem which was dedicated to his memory and was known as the chapel of St. Stephen the Protomartyr (First Martyr).

The True Meaning of the Song "The 12 Days of Christmas"

Christmas is a season of the Christian Year that lasts for 12 days, from December 25th through January 6th, the Day of Epiphany. On January 6th, we celebrate the Revelation of the Holy Trinity and the Roman Catholic Church recalls the Journey of the Three Wise Men. The song "The Twelve Days of Christmas" was written to be a type of catechism in order to not only teach but to be sung in public without someone being persecuted for singing a religious song in public. The song has two levels of interpretation: the surface meaning plus the code word for religious reality. We Orthodox Christians can relate to this religious reality as found in the song.

So, the next time you hear the song just remember the religious reality of the words and may that religious reality bring joy to your Christmas season! 1. The (One) partridge in a pear tree is Jesus Christ. 2. The Two turtledoves are the Old and New Testaments. 3. The Three French hens stand for Faith, Hope and Love. 4. The Four calling birds are the 4 Gospels. 5. The Five gold rings recall the Torah (Law), the first 5 Books of the Old Testament. 6. The Six geese-a-laying stand for the 6 Days of Creation. 7. The Seven swans-a-swimming represent the Sevenfold Gifts of the Holy Spirit. 8. The **Eight maid-a-milking** are the **8 Beatitudes**. 9. The **Nine Ladies dancing** are the 9 fruits of the Holy Spirit (Gal. 5). 10. The Ten lords-a-leaping are the 10 Commandments. 11. The Eleven pipers piping stand for the **11 Faithful Disciples**. 12. The Twelve drummers drumming stand for the 12 Points of Belief in the Nicene Creed.


Fr. Dean's Wish List

Sacramental Dates for 2015

According to the Orthodox Faith and our Holy Greek Orthodox Church the following information is to be used for the proper scheduling of Sacraments within our Holy Orthodox Church. These days are to be followed and adhered to by the Clergy and our laity. A Sacrament can be conducted on one of the non-permissible days only if absolutely necessary and then only by special permission of our Metropolitan.

ADULT CHRISMATIONS

Chrismations may take place on any day of the week throughout the year (except Good Friday). A Chrismation will take place only after proper instruction with the Parish Priest and discussion of the appropriate time and day for the Chrismation.

BAPTISM

Baptisms CANNOT BE CONDUCTED on the following days:

- Great Lent February 23 April 4 (allowed but discouraged)
- Holy Week April 5 April 11
- PASCHA April 12
- Sunday of Thomas April 19
- Pentecost May 31

- Assumption of the Theotokos August 15
- Christmas Fast November 15-December 24 (allowed but discouraged)
- Christmas Day December 25
